Philippians 1.3-11

Introductory Brainstorm:

Tell the group about a time when a Christian friend has shown their care for you in a special way.

Read Philippians 1.3-11

Paul wrote to the Philippian Christians to thank them for a financial gift they had sent him while he was in prison and to explain why Epaphroditus - their messenger - was coming back sooner than expected. As he did this, he took the opportunity to thank and encourage them for their wider 'partnership in the gospel', as well as dealing with some of the issues that were facing them as a church.

List the words and phrases within the passage that speak about the relationship between Paul and these Christians. What do they tell you about the nature of that relationship?

Philippians 1.3-11

Introductory Brainstorm:

Tell the group about a time when a Christian friend has shown their care for you in a special way.

Read Philippians 1.3-11

Paul wrote to the Philippian Christians to thank them for a financial gift they had sent him while he was in prison and to explain why Epaphroditus - their messenger - was coming back sooner than expected. As he did this, he took the opportunity to thank and encourage them for their wider 'partnership in the gospel', as well as dealing with some of the issues that were facing them as a church.

List the words and phrases within the passage that speak about the relationship between Paul and these Christians. What do they tell you about the nature of that relationship?

joy, partnership, feel this way about you, have you in my heart (or you have me in your heart), share in God's grace, long for all of you with the affection of Christ Jesus.

It expresses a deep and rich relationship between Paul and the Philippians - which is a real challenge to us as we consider our relationship with our link missionaries. However, it was also unusual among the Pauline churches - no other letter expresses this depth of relationship between Paul and the church.

The foundation lay in the gospel and in their common faith and growth in Christ.

How may this have enabled the partnership between Paul and the Philippians to remain strong and lasting?

It is not wrong to enjoy a deep friendship with fellow Christians - including missionaries - but if that lies at the foundation of our relationships they will not be 'partnerships in the gospel'

We need to help people see the difference between the two, and to think about how that will affect the way in which we express and build the relationship.

Think about the missionaries connected with your church. How would you describe the relationship of you (or your church) to them?

Could you speak about this relationship in the way Paul does? Why/why not?

4.10-19 *they sent financial support*

Acts 16.13-15 *Lydia invited them to stay at her home - she provided hospitality*
